FAMILY REUNION WELCOMES BACK SNYDER

K-STATE OPENS 2009 CAMPAIGN WITH UMass, FAMILY REUNION

Kansas State opens its much-anticipated 2009 season of football on Saturday as the Wildcats welcome Massachusetts to Bill Snyder Family Stadium for a 6:10 p.m. matchup in head coach Bill Snyder's first game back following a three-year retirement.

The game will not be televised but will be broadcast live across the K-State Sports Network, online at www.k-statesports.com and on SIRIUS satellite radio channel 161. Wyatt Thompson will call the action with Stan Weber serving as the color analyst and Matt Walters providing updates from the sideline.

Saturday's season opener will cap a Family Reunion weekend in Manhattan as all of K-State Nation has been welcomed back to celebrate the return of Snyder to the sidelines. Over 300 former K-State football players plus their families will be among those in attendance for the UMass game and will be honored during pregame activities. The players will also don K-State jerseys provided by GTM Sportswear.

Following Saturday's contest, a spectacular fireworks show will cap the weekend's activities. The fireworks show, presented by the K-State Student Union Program Council, K-State Athletics, Commerce Bank, Briggs Auto, Varney's Bookstore and Kite's Bar and Grill, will be choreographed to music and will be similar to a show that was a huge success following a Wildcat baseball game this past spring.

A QUICK LOOK AT THE WILDCATS

Kansas State fans will get their first look at the Snyder-led Wildcats in 2009 this Saturday against UMass. The Wildcats will be led this season by captains Carson Coffman (QB), Nick Stringer (OL), Jeron Mastrud (TE) and Alex Hrebec (LB). The bulk of K-State's experience on offense resides along the line and at wide receiver as K-State will open the 2009 season with a new quarterback for the first time since 2007. Whomever takes the first snap in 2009 will have several go-to guys to count on as All-Big 12 performers Brandon Banks (WR) and Mastrud return for their senior seasons as the duo combined for 105 catches and 11 touchdowns last season. Stringer has 23 career starts along the offensive line, while the group has a total of six returners who have earned at least one start in their careers.

Defensively, the Cats return up to eight regular starters from a year ago and are looking for big seasons from the likes of Jeffrey Fitzgerald, Eric Childs, Tysyn Hartman, Joshua Moore and Hrebec, among others. K-State returns its top six tacklers from a year ago, led by Moore, who had 76 stops, 12 pass breakups and three interceptions.

SEASON NO. 114

Kansas State will open its 114th season of college football this weekend against Massachusetts and its 14th season as a member of the Big 12 Conference. The Wildcats enter the 2009 season with an all-time record of 452-598-41 (.433), with over 30-percent of those wins coming under the watchful eye of head coach Bill Snyder. The Cats have also sported a 152-78-1 (.660) record since 1990 and have appeared in 13 bowl games.

SNYDER SUCCESSFUL IN OPENERS

Head coach Bill Snyder has almost always gotten the most out of his teams from the opening bell as Snyder-led teams are riding a 16-game winning streak in season openers and the Wildcats will put that streak on the line when they face Massachusetts.

With the 2005 season-opening victory against Florida International, Kansas State broke the school record for consecutive conference-opening wins with 16, while that streak was extended to 17 in 2006.

The Wildcats have not dropped a season opener under Snyder since his inaugural campaign at K-State, when the Cats lost at Arizona State, 31-0, at Sun Devil Stadium on Sept. 9, 1989.

Saturday's game vs. UMass will mark the 13th season debut under Snyder at the stadium that now bears his name. However, K-State is opening in Manhattan under Snyder for just the fourth time in his last seven seasons.

NON-CONFERENCE NOTABLES

Kansas State has been one of the most dominant teams in terms of non-conference success, having won 10 of its last 14 non-conference games, while the Wildcats have had perfect non-conference ledgers eight times in the last 12 years.

Under head coach Bill Snyder, K-State is 60-12 (.833) overall against non-conference opposition, including a 59-9 (.868) mark since the start of the 1990 season. Of the nine losses since 1990, five occurred in bowl games, giving the Cats a 53-4 (.930) record in all regular-season non-conference contests. That record has been even more impressive at home as K-State has won 53 of its last 55 non-conference home games.

SNYDER AMONG BEST ACTIVE COACHES

The author of the greatest turnaround in college football history, Bill Snyder returns for his second tour of duty guiding Kansas State when the Wildcats open against Massachusetts on Saturday. And, despite enduring two losing seasons at the end of his first tenure and a three-year hiatus, Snyder's work still ranks among the best in college football when compared to other active coaches. Snyder, who currently ranks 14th all-time in wins among active FBS coaches, is one of just two active BCS coaches who have served at the same school for at least 17 years and have never held the same position at another school as he shares that distinction with Joe Paterno of Penn State. Also, Snyder holds the 12th-highest winning percentage among active FBS coaches with at least 100 wins.

What might be even more amazing is that Snyder, despite the three-year layoff, has tallied the sixth most victories among active coaches since 1990. Snyder has guided Kansas State to 135 victories since the 1990 season, only to be out-done by the likes of Mack Brown, Bobby Bowden, Frank Beamer, Joe Paterno and Steve Spurrier.

SNYDER IN SEPTEMBERS

Fast starts propelled the Wildcats to winning seasons throughout the first Bill Snyder era at K-State. From 1992-2005, K-State was a combined 42-3 (.933) in games played during the month of September. The lone losses during that stretch occurred against Fresno State on Sept. 11, 2004, vs. Marshall on Sept. 20, 2003, and at then-No. 3 Oklahoma on Sept. 29, 2001.

A LOOK AT THE OPPONENT: MASSACHUSETTS

The winningest program in the Colonial Athletic Association over the last decade will enter a new era against Kansas State on Saturday as Kevin Morris, the offensive coordinator the last five seasons, will patrol the sidelines as the UMass head coach for the first time. The Minutemen, who are ranked No. 18 in the FCS Coaches Preseason Poll, feature preseason all-Americans in left tackle Vladimir Ducasse, wide receiver Victor Cruz, linebacker Josh Jennings and free safety Jeromy Miles.

Massachusetts, which boasts a roster of 41 juniors and seniors, returns its top rusher in Tony Nelson, who totalled 1,325 yards and tallied 12 touchdowns, as well as its leading receiver in Cruz, who hauled in 71 receptions for 1,064 yards and six scores. The Minutemen will have to replace its starting quarterback from a year ago in Liam Coen, who was 206-for-334 for 2,749 yards and 24 touchdowns.

On defense, the Minutemen return their top two leading tacklers in Miles (104 tackles) and Jennings (90 tackles). Jennings was also tied for the team lead with 7.0 tackles-for-loss, while Miles tied for the team lead with three interceptions.

K-STATE AGAINST THE FCS AND THE COLONIAL

The Massachusetts games marks the first of two Football Championship Subdivision teams Kansas State will face this season. The Wildcats, who will meet UMass for the second time in school history, have faced an FCS team in each of the last four seasons and in seven of the last eight. Since 1989, the Wildcats have played 14 FCS members and posted a 13-1 record in those games, including having won 12 in a row. The game also marks just the second matchup for the Wildcats against a Colonial Athletic Association school.

THE CAPTAIN'S CHAIR

Following the 2009 spring game, head coach Bill Snyder named four captains for the 2009 season, the first in Snyder's second tour of duty. Senior tight end Jeron Mastrud, senior offensive lineman Nick Stringer, junior quarterback Carson Coffman and sophomore linebacker Alex Hrebec were each voted a captain for the first time in their careers.

Along with the four captains, five other players - Corey Adams, Chris Carney, Eric Childs, Tysyn Hartman and Ulla Pomele - were named players representatives for the 2009 season. All nine players have started for the majority of at least one season, except for Coffman, who is in the running to make his first collegiate start on Saturday.

BACK FOR MORE

Kansas State returns 47 total lettermen and 15 regular starters for 2009 and heads into the season with one of the most veteran teams in recent K-State history in terms of returning lettermen. The 47 letterwinners K-State returns this season are tied for the second most since 2000, only out-done by the 2007 squad, which had 48. The 2000 team also returned 47 letterwinners for fall camp.

In terms of production, the Cats will have some holes to fill on the offensive side of the ball as Kansas State returns just 9-percent of its passing yardage, 22-percent of its receiving yards and 42-percent of its scoring. The Cats do return 69-percent of their rushing, but their third-leading rusher last season, Logan Dold, switched to defensive back in the spring.

On the bright side, K-State could be poised for a big year on defense as it returns experience across the board. The Cats return 66-percent of their tackle production, including seven of the top eight tacklers in 2008. Kansas State also returns 58-percent of its sacks, 67-percent of its tackles-for-loss and 60-percent of its interceptions from a year ago.

HOME FIELD ADVANTAGE

Few teams in college football have taken care of their home field as well as the Wildcats since the start of the 1990 season. Over the past 18 years, K-State is an amazing 101-23-1 (.812) when playing at Bill Snyder Family Stadium, including a 49-17-1 mark (.739) in league games (combined Big 8/Big 12).

That winning percentage grows exponentially when you talk about home non-conference games. Since the start of the 1990 season, Kansas State is an amazing 52-3 (.945) against non-league foes at home. The Cats held a 41-game home winning streak against non-conference opponents until No. 6 Kansas State was upset by Marshall on Sept. 20, 2003. The Wildcats also lost non-conference games at home against Fresno State on Sept. 11, 2004, and No. 8 Louisville on Sept. 23, 2006. K-State has won each of its last five non-league games at Bill Snyder Family Stadium.

OUT OF THE BLOCKS

The Wildcats have been a quick-starting team in season openers in recent years. Since 1990, the Wildcats have averaged 33 points in season debuts and have been held to fewer than 21 points just two times. K-State has hit the 40-point mark on six occasions, including a high of 66 points in the Cats' 1998 debut vs. Indiana State. Most recently, Kansas State has scored 24 or more points in six of the last seven season-openers, including a 45-point outburst last season against North Texas.

DRAWING FIRST BLOOD

Scoring first has been a big sign of good things to come for the Wildcats. Kansas State opened the game's scoring in 10 of 12 contests in 2007 and continued that trend in 2008 by putting the first points on the board in seven of its 12 contests. Since 1990, K-State's record when scoring first is even more dramatic as the Wildcats have gone 118-21 (85-percent) when drawing first blood.

CATS OWN NATION'S 10TH-LONGEST SCORING STREAK

Kansas State extended one of the nation's longest scoring streaks last season by scoring in all 12 games a year ago. The Wildcats have now tallied points in 152 consecutive games. The 152-game stretch is the 10th longest streak in the nation after Colorado and Washington State - who each held a spot in the top 10 - were blanked in a game last season. The Wildcats have not been kept off the scoreboard since Colorado shutout K-State, 12-0, on Nov. 16, 1996. In the Big 12, only Nebraska (164 games) owns a longer streak than the Cats.

NEW YEAR, NEW QB

Kansas State will have a new starting quarterback when the Wildcats take the field on Saturday against Massachusetts, which will go along with the trend of new starting quarterbacks at Kansas State since 2000. Eight of the last nine seasons have seen a quarterback open the season who did not start the season opener the year prior. The only exception is Josh Freeman who started the 2007 and 2008 seasons as the No. 1 quarterback.

There have been three occasions where a player started a season two years removed from another season-opening start. Paul Watson opened up the Bill Snyder era as the No. 1 quarterback in 1989. After Carl Straw began the 1990 season as the starter, Watson was back as the season-opening starter in 1991.

Ten years later, Eli Roberson started the 2001 opener as a sophomore before relinquishing that role to Marc Dunn in 2002. Roberson then started the 2003 season as the No. 1 quarterback. After Roberson's departure, Dylan Meier stepped into the starting quarterback position to open the 2004 campaign before Allen Webb started the 2005 season. As a senior, Meier returned to open the 2006 campaign.

JUCO INFUSION

Kansas State has been the staple of college football of turning junior-college transfers into quality players on the FBS level. Since the mid 1990s, K-State has seen 25 of its former junior college players earn All-Big 12 accolades, with seven of those going on to be selected as an All-American. Most recently, junior-college transfer and wide receiver Brandon Banks earned Big 12 Newcomer of the Year accolades in 2008.

There are plenty of fresh faces from the junior-college ranks for the 2009 season, many of whom will vie for playing time, including running back Daniel Thomas, defensive end Kadero Terrell and defensive backs Emmanuel Lamur and Troy Butler. Both Terrell and Butler enrolled in time for the spring semester and participated in spring drills. Thomas and Lamur have both impressed during fall camp and will be pushing for starting spots.

In 2008, Kansas State had four junior-college transfers that gained significant playing time in their first seasons in Manhattan. One of those individuals was Banks, who led the Wildcats in receptions, receiving yards, receiving touchdowns, kickoff-return average and all-purpose yards.

On the defensive side of the ball, JuCo transfer Ulla Pomele played in all 12 games, earning six starts, as he finished fourth on the team with 58 tackles.

FROM WALK-ON TO SUCCESS

K-State has seen 12 different Wildcats who were at one time walk-ons flourish and become starters over the past three seasons, including the latest additions to that group in 2008, running back Keithen Valentine, defensive back Rashad Harrell, punter D.J. Fulhage and linebacker Alex Hrebec. Also, of those 12 players, four earned All-Big 12 Conference accolades (Jordy Nelson, Tim Reyer, Marcus Watts and Ian Campbell).

The Wildcats have been notorious for turning walk-ons into all-stars as players like current NFL stand-outs Nelson and Jon McGraw began their Wildcat careers as walk-ons.

VERY SPECIAL TEAMS

The rise of Kansas State football over the last two decades has much to do with the emphasis on special teams. Since 1990, Kansas State is 40-13 when scoring on special teams and 16-1 when scoring on special teams and on defense. And, in non-offensive touchdowns, the Wildcats have ranked among the nation's best over the past 10 seasons. Since 1999, the Wildcats rank second nationally in non-offensive touchdowns with 68, behind only Virginia Tech (72).

Kansas State led the nation last season in punt returns for touchdowns with five, including four that were a result of blocked punts. Also, there were a total of 13 punt returns for touchdowns in the Big 12 last season, nearly half of which were by K-State. The Cats were also second in the nation last season in blocked kicks.

BLOCK PARTY

Kansas State's play on special teams has been unparalleled since 1990 as the Cats have the fifth-most blocks in the nation since 2002 with 33, which includes a school-record-tying nine total blocks last season (four punts, two extra points and three field goals).

Also, Kansas State has amassed 50 total blocked kicks since 1996 and currently ranks second among Big 12 schools in total blocks in the 13-year history of the league.

POINT OF NO RETURN

Not only has Kansas State excelled in blocking and returning kicks, the Wildcats have also been superb in the area of kick coverage. Last season, the Wildcats ranked first in the Big 12 and sixth nationally in kickoff return defense, surrendering just 17.8 yards per return. The longest return given up last season was 37 yards to Oklahoma. The Cats also received 22 touchbacks from Brooks Rossman in 2008, which was 12th nationally.

YOU CAN BANK ON IT

At just 5-7, senior Brandon Banks made quite a big splash during his first season in a Wildcat uniform in 2008. All the Garner, N.C., native did was finish 19th in the nation and fifth in the Big 12 with 1,049 receiving yards en route to earning Big 12 Offensive Newcomer of the Year honors. Banks tallied four 100-yard receiving games, including a 145-yard, one-touchdown effort against No. 4 Oklahoma. Banks was on the receiving end of a 77-yard pass play against the Sooners, which was the longest play from scrimmage since an 80-yard catch by Jordy Nelson in 2005, until he took a handoff 93 yards for a score at Missouri.

Not only is Banks a weapon on offense, but also is in the kicking game as he was an All-Big 12 Honorable Mention returner after ranking 15th nationally and second in the Big 12 with a kickoff-return average of 28.0. Banks' longest return last year came against Nebraska as he took a kickoff back 98 yards for a touchdown.

JUCO CONNECTION

Former junior-college transfer Brandon Banks may not have been an All-American in 2008, but he did record an All-American-type season when he accumulated 1,049 receiving yards and nine receiving touchdowns. His 1,049 yards were comparable to what former JuCo transfers Darnell McDonald and Quincy Morgan collected in their all-American season of 1998 and 2000, respectively. Furthermore, Banks' nine receiving touchdowns are equal to McDonald's mark. Below is a comparison of Banks in 2008, Morgan in 2000 and McDonald in 1998:

BIG-PLAY BRANDON

Brandon Banks had a knack for making the big play when Kansas State needed it last season. In fact, the wide receiver was responsible for five of the Wildcats' 10 longest plays from scrimmage, including a 93-yard run at Missouri, which is the second-longest rush in K-State history.

Banks also returned the longest kickoff of the season for K-State, a 98-yarder against Nebraska. His 98-yard return proved to be tied for the fourth longest in K-State history as Mack Herron took a kickoff back 100 yards and 99 yards in 1968, while Gerald Neasman also tallied a 99-yard return in 1997.

CAREER MILESTONE

Senior tight end Jeron Mastrud, who is on the watch list for the John Mackey Award, is on the footsteps of accomplishing a mark that just three other individuals in K-State history have been able to reach. The Beaverton, Ore., native is just 14 yards away from becoming the fourth tight end in school history to tally 1,000 receiving yards. And, with a season like he had in 2008 when he recorded 435 yards, Mastrud could break the school record for career receiving yards by a tight end. That mark is currently held by Henry Childs, who racked up 1,365 career receiving yards from 1971-73.

HARD WORK OFF THE FIELD

Not only does Jeron Mastrud produce on the field, but he also produces off. The senior tight end, who was an academic All-Big 12, All-District and All-American selection in 2008, is a candidate for the All-state/American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Good Works Team, which honors college football players who make outstanding contributions in the areas of volunteerism and civic involvement.

A three-year member of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, Mastrud has participated in various community service activities while at K-State, including Cats for Cans, Read to Achieve, Walkin' with a Wildcat, Adopt-a-Family, while he also assisted with cleanup after a tornado damaged a Manhattan community last June.

FULLBACK IS BACK

With the return of head coach Bill Snyder comes the return of a position that has been absent on K-State offenses for the past three seasons: fullback. Since 2006, there have only been three times that K-State has started a fullback in a game, all three coming in the '06 campaign. All that could change on Saturday as freshman Braden Wilson or junior Lucas Hamm could line up in the fullback position to start the season.

HREBEC WREAKED HAVOC

From walk-on backup to a starter for the last six games of the season, sophomore linebacker Alex Hrebec was stellar for the Wildcats during the final stages of 2008. The St. Louis, Mo., native, who was voted as a team captain, finished second on the team with 68 tackles, including 52 in the final six games of the season. The sophomore was tied for 16th on the team in tackles after the first five games of the season, an average of two tackles per game. But his late-season surge of 7.8-tackles-per-game over the final six games improved him to second and propelled him to CFN All-Freshman honors.

The sophomore finished out the season by carding a career-high 11 tackles against Iowa State, including 1.5 sacks. That came on the heels of a nine-tackle performance against Nebraska and a 10-tackle effort with his first career sack at Missouri.

NOT A CHILD ANYMORE

Senior defensive end Eric Childs, who started the final nine games of last season, turned in two of the better performances of his career in the final stretches of the season. The Arlington, Texas, product carded a career-best 12 tackles, including one for a loss, and one pass breakup at Missouri, while he came back with seven tackles, 2.5 tackles for loss, one sack and one forced fumble against Nebraska. His 12 stops vs. the Tigers were a career-best, doubling his previous career high of six against both Iowa State in 2007 and Texas Tech earlier in his junior campaign.

Childs, who finished sixth on the team with 52 tackles, is looking to finish his career on a high note after a junior campaign that saw him earn honorable mention All-Big 12 honors. Voted a player representative by his teammates for the 2009 season, Childs finished third in the Big 12 in tackles among defensive linemen. He finished behind Nebraska's Ndamukong Suh and Oklahoma's Jeremy Beal, both of whom earned Second Team All-Big 12 honors.

MOORE CONSISTENT

Junior defensive back Joshua Moore was one of the Wildcats' best defenders in 2008, especially against Big 12 competition. Moore led the team with 76 tackles, including a team-best 53 unassisted stops. Also, the Pompano Beach, Fla., product was the fifth-best tackler among Big 12 defensive backs in conference games with 57 stops. Moore also harassed opposing quarterbacks last year as he recorded 15 passes defended, including three interceptions. Moore's 15 passes defended – which all came in Big 12 play – were tops in the Big 12 and tied for 13th nationally.

BEHIND ENEMY LINES

Brandon Harold, who was one of just two true freshmen to play last season, had a huge impact on the defensive line. At six-foot six, 264 pounds, Harold was a force when it came to wrapping up ball carriers behind the line, leading the team with 10.5 tackles-for-loss, while he was second in sacks with three. A freshman All-American by numerous publications, Harold finished the season first in the nation in TFLs among defensive linemen. A native of East St. Louis, Ill., Harold recorded two games with three tackles for loss against Montana State and Louisiana and also tallied career highs in tackles (seven) and sacks (two) against the Ragin' Cajuns. Harold was one of 11 players on the team with at least 45 tackles and was tied for ninth in tackles in the Big 12 among defensive linemen.
