- One of only seven schools in the nation to appear in a bowl game in 11 of the last 12 years
- Owns a 52-27 record in Big 12 play; K-State ranks third in number of total league wins since the inception of the league in 1996
- Big 12 Conference-record 22 straight league wins from 1997 to 1999
- Fifth-winningest home record in college football during the 1990s
- After posting a 1-36-1 record in 1980s, Kansas State has tallied a 130-40-1 mark since 1990
- K-State completed its first-ever undefeated regular season with an 11-0 mark in 1998
- Recognized as a community leader who has been a key supporter of the university's Hale Library and leadership programs on campus, in addition to being named the 1999 Kansas/Manhattan Citizen of the Year

1989 (1-10)

- In Snyder's first year, the Wildcats snapped a 30-game winless streak and a 16-game losing streak with a last-minute drive to beat North Texas 20-17 at home.

1990 (5-6)

- Kansas State is one of just four teams in the country to improve its record by at least four wins over the previous season as the Wildcats posted a 5-6 mark for their most wins since 1982.
- K-State picked up its first Big Eight wins in four years by defeating Oklahoma State, 23-17, and Iowa State, 28-14, at KSU Stadium.
- K-State goes 5-1 at KSU Stadium.
- K-State defeated New Mexico State 52-7 in the second game of the season for the program's widest margin of victory since 1955.
- Snyder is chosen Big Eight Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and Co-Big Eight Coach of the Year by the coaches.
- K-State football voted the top sports story in Kansas by the Associated Press.

1991 (7-4)

- K-State won seven games for the first time in 37 years and finished fourth in the Big Eight at 4-3.
- The Wildcats fell four plays short of a Big Eight championship with a remarkable 38-31 last-minute loss at Nebraska and a heartbreaking 10-0 loss to Colorado.
- K-State scored 13 unanswered points in the fourth quarter to beat Kansas 16-12.
- K-State won its first road game in six years with a 37-7 victory at Iowa State.
- K-State registered its first shutout since 1975, and its first against a Big Eight opponent since 1970, with a 32-0 victory against Missouri to ensure the first winning season in nine years.
- K-State won its final three games of the season for the first time since 1934 and picked up win No. 7 with a 36-26 victory at Oklahoma State.
- K-State went 5-1 at home to stretch its home record in the 1990s to 10-2 and won six consecutive home games for the first time in 69 years.
- ESPN proclaimed Snyder as its National Coach of the Year.
- Snyder was named AP's Big Eight Coach of the Year and was Co-Big Eight Coach of the Year by the coaches for the second year in a row.

1992 (5-6)

- FS Jaime Mendez set a school and modern-day Big Eight record by intercepting four passes in a 35-14 win over Temple.
- K-State appeared on national television for the first time in 10 years and defeated Iowa State, 22-13, on ESPN.
- K-State completed its first perfect home season since 1934 by shutting out Oklahoma State, 10-0, to go 5-0 at KSU Stadium.
- K-State played Nebraska in the Coca-Cola Bowl in Tokyo, Japan, Dec. 5.
- Punter Sean Snyder earned consensus All-America honors and became the first Wildcat to earn first team All-America accolades from the Associated Press.
- Bill Snyder was chosen to coach the North team in the Blue-Gray game.

1993 (9-2-1) WeiserLock Copper Bowl Champions

- K-State's record was its second-best in school history and best since 1910.
- The Wildcats won a bowl game for the first time in school history with a 52-17 win over Wyoming in the Copper Bowl.
- The Wildcats finished the season ranked in the Top 20 for the first time ever and were ranked in the Top 25 for the final 10 weeks of the season.
- In three consecutive weeks, K-State pushed Nebraska to the wire before losing, tied 16th-ranked Colorado, 16-16, and defeated 14th-ranked Oklahoma, 21-7.

- K-State snapped an 18-game non-conference road losing streak with a 30-25 win at Minnesota (the only team to beat Rose Bowl champion Wisconsin in '93).
- K-State was perfect in nonconference play (4-0) for first time since 1954.
- K-State extended its home unbeaten streak to 13.
- Bill Snyder was named AP Big Eight Coach of the Year for the third time.
- Six different Wildcats earned All-America recognition, including consensus first-team free safety Jaime Mendez.
- QB Chad May set four Big Eight records, including 489 passing yards at Nebraska.

1994 (9-3) Jeep-Eagle Aloha Bowl

- K-State won at least nine games in back-to-back seasons for the first time in school history.
- The Wildcats played in the Aloha Bowl, marking the first time K-State had ever appeared in a bowl game in consecutive seasons.
- K-State was ranked No. 8 in the USA Today/CNN Coaches Poll for the final four weeks of the regular season, representing the highest ranking to that point in school history.
- The Wildcats achieved the No. 11 ranking in the AP poll, representing the highest ranking by the AP in school history to that point.
- K-State finished the season ranked in the Top 20 for the second straight year.
- K-State finished third in the Big Eight for the second year in a row. Its 5-2 league mark was the best since 1970.
- With a 37-20 win at Oklahoma, K-State defeated OU in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 1969-70, and won in Norman for the first time since 1970.
- K-State won at Kansas (21-13) for the first time since 1969 and at Missouri (21-18) for the first time since 1985.
- CNN named Bill Snyder National Coach of the Year.
- Senior QB Chad May finished his career with 10 Big Eight records and finished 11th in the Heisman Trophy voting.
- Chris Canty was named Big Eight Defensive Freshman of the Year.

1995 (10-2) Plymouth Holiday Bowl Champions

- K-State tied the 1910 team for the most wins in school history.
- The Wildcats cracked the AP Top 10 for the first time in school history and finished the season ranked in the Top 10 for the first time in school history (No. 6 in the USA Today/CNN Coaches Poll and No. 7 by AP).
- Seven different players earned All-America recognition, including first-team consensus All-American Chris Canty.
- K-State led the nation in total defense by allowing just 250.8 yards per game, the best figure in the Big Eight since 1987.
- K-State posted three consecutive shutouts, becoming the first team to accomplish that feat since Boston College in 1992.
- DT Tim Colston was named Big Eight Defensive Player of the Year.
- CB Chris Canty was one of five finalists for the Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Year Award and one of three finalists for the Jim Thorpe Award.
- Linebacker Travis Ochs was named Big Eight Defensive Freshman of the Year.
- Bill Snyder a finalist for National Coach of the Year by the Football Writers and Football News.

1996 (9-3) Southwestern Bell Cotton Bowl

- K-State became one of six schools to win nine games each season from 1993-96.
- The Wildcats were ranked in the Top 25 each week of the season.
- K-State defeated both Kansas and Oklahoma for the fourth straight year.
- The Wildcats advanced to a bowl game for the

fourth consecutive year, and played in its first-ever New Year's Day Bowl at the Southwestern Bell Cotton Bowl. More than 45,000 Kansas State fans attended the game in Dallas for a Cotton Bowl record by one school.

- Senior receiver Kevin Lockett became K-State's all-time leading receiver and finished his career as the Big Eight's all-time receptions leader.
- Junior CB Chris Canty earned consensus All-America honors for the second time and was a finalist for Bronko Nagurski National Defensive Player of the Year, Jim Thorpe Award and Maxwell Defensive Award. He was named defensive back of the year by the Touchdown Club of Columbus.
- LB Mark Simoneau became the third consecutive Wildcat to earn conference defensive freshman of the year award (with Canty and Travis Ochs).
- Kevin Lockett and Jason Johnson earned first team GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America honors. Johnson also won a National Football Foundation Postgraduate Scholarship.

1997 (11-1) Tostitos Fiesta Bowl Champions

- K-State remained one of six schools to win nine games each season from 1993-97.
- The Wildcats won 11 games for the first time in school history, 10 games in a season for the third time in school history, and 10 regular-season games for the first time since 1910 (10-1).
- The Wildcats were ranked in the Top 25 each week of the season.
- K-State defeated both Kansas and Oklahoma for the fifth straight year.
- The Wildcats advanced to a bowl game for the fifth consecutive year, and played in their first-ever Alliance Bowl and defeated Big East champion Syracuse 35-18 in the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl. An estimated 50,000 K-State fans attended the game.
- K-State extended its streak to 39 straight wins over non-ranked teams at KSU Stadium.
- Junior Martin Gramatica won the Lou Groza Award, given annually to the nation's outstanding place-kicker. Gramatica became the school's all-time leading scorer and led the nation in field-goal accuracy by making 19 of 20 three-pointers. He earned consensus All-America honors.
- K-State became one of just five schools to win each of its opening games of the 1990s.
- K-State led the Big 8/12 Conference in pass defense for the fourth consecutive season, finishing the season ranked fifth in the nation in pass efficiency defense and fourth in total defense.

1998 (11-2) Builders Square Alamo Bowl Big 12 North Division Champions

- K-State became one of six schools to win at least nine games in each of the last six seasons (1993-98).
- K-State won the Big 12 Conference North Division and advanced to the Big 12 Championship game.
- The Wildcats attained their first No. 1 football ranking in school history and held the top spot in the USA Today/ESPN Coaches Poll for four weeks in November.
- K-State defeated Nebraska for the first time since 1968. In doing so, the Wildcats became the first team to beat every team in the Big 12 Conference since the league's inception in 1996.
- The Wildcats advanced to a bowl game for the sixth year in a row.
- Michael Bishop was runner-up for both the Heisman Trophy and Associated Press Player of the Year. The senior quarterback won the Davey O'Brien Award and was a Maxwell Award finalist.
- Coach Bill Snyder was named the Paul 'Bear' Bryant National Coach of the Year, Associated Press National Coach of the Year, Walter Camp National Coach of the Year and Bobby Dodd National Coach of the Year. He also was named Big 12 Coach of the Year.
- The Wildcats ranked among the top 10 in nine of the 12 national team categories. K-State ranked in the top five nationally in four of those categories,

including scoring offense (1st), punt returns (1st), total defense (3rd) and net punting (3rd).

- Michael Bishop, Jeff Kelly, Martin Gramatica, Mark Simoneau, Darnell McDonald, Jarrod Cooper and David Allen each earned All-America honors.
- K-State won 11 games for the second straight season.
- Gramatica set an NCAA record for kick scoring (135 points) and booted the longest field goal in NCAA history without the use of a tee (65 yards vs. Northern Illinois).

1999 (11-1) Culligan Holiday Bowl Champions Big 12 North Division Co-Champions

- K-State became one of just four schools (with Nebraska, Florida and Florida State) to win every opener in the 1990s.
- K-State and Florida State became the only two teams in the nation to win at least 11 games in 1997, 1998 and 1999.
- K-State won at least nine games for the seventh straight season (one of five teams) and qualified for its seventh straight (one of eight teams) bowl appearance.
- K-State tied for the Big 12 North Division title with a 7-1 league mark.
- K-State led the nation in pass efficiency defense and turnover margin, while finishing second in total defense and third in scoring defense.
- K-State's pass efficiency defense rating was the best in the NCAA since 1978.
- LB Mark Simoneau was runner-up for the Butkus Award; PK Jamie Rheem was runner-up for the Groza Award; and PR David Allen was a finalist for the Tatupu Award.
- Mark Simoneau earned consensus first team All-America honors, while David Allen, Jamie Rheem, Darren Howard and Lamar Chapman also earned All-America honors.
- K-State's final No. 6 national ranking was the highest end-of-season ranking in school history.

2000 (11-3) SBC Cotton Bowl Classic Champions Big 12 North Division Champions

- Wildcats won their season opener for the 11th consecutive season.
- K-State won 11 games for the fourth consecutive season, joining Florida State as the only other school in the nation with such a streak and only the third time in college-football history a team has had such consistent success. It reached double-figure wins for the fifth time in the last six years and for just the sixth time in school history.
- Extended a streak of nine-win seasons to eight, one of four teams in the nation with such a streak joining only Nebraska, Florida and Florida State.
- Won second outright Big 12 North Division championship in last three seasons and marked the third straight year with at least a share of the title.
- K-State beat Nebraska at home for the second consecutive time, the first time in school history K-State has beaten Nebraska in back-to-back games in Manhattan.
- K-State tied the school record with 42 rushing touchdowns.
- WR Quincy Morgan became the first player in K-State history to record back-to-back seasons with 1,000 receiving yards.
- PK Jamie Rheem became K-State's fourth consecutive finalist for the Lou Groza Award. Rheem earned first team All-America honors, while Quincy Morgan and Mario Fatafeh also earned various All-America awards.
- K-State ranked sixth nationally in total defense, the fourth consecutive season the Wildcats have been ranked in the top 10 defensively.

2001 (6-6) Insight.com Bowl

- Won four of last five games, with only loss in that stretch to Rose Bowl-participant Nebraska.
- One of only six schools nationally with two Verizon Academic All-Americans.
- Wildcats won season opener for 12th straight season.
- K-State is one of seven schools to appear in a bowl game for the ninth straight season, joined by Nebraska, Michigan, Florida State, Tennessee, Florida and Virginia Tech.
- K-State had the fourth-toughest schedule in the nation, with eight of the 11 opponents playing in postseason bowls.
- K-State won the Governor's Trophy for the ninth straight time, beating cross-state rival Kansas.
- K-State finished third in the nation in total defense, the only school to rank in the top 10 nationally in each of the last five seasons.

2002 (11-2) Pacific Life Holiday Bowl Champions

- With an 11-2 record, earned the school's fifth season with 11 wins in the last six years. K-State has had at least 10 wins in six of the last eight seasons.
- Kansas State posted its ninth season with at least nine victories in the past 10 years.
- The Wildcats finished the season with six straight wins, giving the team a 19-2 record in November over the last six years.
- Kansas State was one of seven schools to make a trip to a bowl game for the 10th straight season.
- The Wildcats finished the regular season ranked first in the nation in total defense and scoring defense, as well as second in the nation in scoring offense.
- In a three-week stretch, Kansas State posted its largest wins in the all-time series over Kansas, Iowa State and Nebraska.
- Terence Newman won the Jim Thorpe Award, given annually to the best collegiate defensive back in the nation. He was also a finalist for the Bronko Nagurski Trophy and a consensus All-American, being selected on the first teams by the FWA, AFCA and Walter Camp voters.
- Newman was also named by the coaches and the Associated Press as the Big 12 Conference Defensive Player of the Year.
- Head Coach Bill Snyder earned the vote of his peers as the Big 12 Conference Coach of the Year. It was his fifth honor as a conference coach of the year in his 14 seasons as head coach at Kansas State.
- The Wildcats set or tied 45 school records during the 2002 season.

2003 (11-4) Tostitos Fiesta Bowl Big 12 Champions/Big 12 North Division Champions

- Head coach Bill Snyder guided K-State to its first conference championship since 1934 as the Wildcats defeat top-ranked Oklahoma, 35-7, in the Big 12 Championship game..
- Win over the Sooners was the first over a No. 1-ranked team in school history and earns K-State its first BCS bowl berth.
- Kansas State became one of seven schools to make a trip to a bowl game for the 11th straight season.
- K-State won its third outright Big 12 North championship, marking the fourth time K-State has owned at least a share of the division crown.
- The Wildcats won their final seven games by an average of over four touchdowns to become just the second team in college football history to win 11 games in 6-of-7 seasons.
- K-State defeated Nebraska, 38-9, for its first win in Lincoln since 1968.
- The Wildcats finished the season ranked eighth in the nation in scoring defense and sixth in total defense, making K-State the only program in the country to rank in the top six in total defense in each of the last seven seasons.
- Darren Sproles, who finished fifth in voting for the

Heisman Trophy, became K-State's first offensive first-team AP All-American.

- Sproles led the nation in total rushing yards (1,986) and all-purpose yardage (2,735) and finished third in AP Player of the Year voting.
- Josh Buhl set the K-State single-season tackle record with 184 stops.
- Buhl earned second-team AP All-America honors, while Nick Leckey, Eli Roberson and James Terry were also named All-Americans.
- K-State set a total of 42 school records during the 2003 season.

2004 (4-7)

- K-State extends its winning streak over Nebraska to three with a 45-21 victory over the Huskers. It is the first time in school history that the Wildcats have won three in a row over Nebraska.
- Darren Sproles earns first team All-Big 12 honors from the AP and closes out his career with 23 school records, including nearly every K-State mark for both rushing and all-purpose yards.
- Sproles also finished his career ranked No. 11 on the NCAA's all-time rushing chart with 4,979 yards and six on the NCAA's all-purpose list with a Big 12 record 6,812 yards.
- Sophomore linebacker Brandon Archer and junior offensive tackle Jeromey Clary are named second team all-Big 12 by the Kansas City Star.
- Brian Casey earns CoSIDA Academic All-District honors.

2005 (4-6)

- Snyder coached his 200th career game as a head coach at Texas Tech, becoming just the 17th active head coach to do so.
- K-State moved to 60-12 against non-conference opponents after starting the season 3-0 against non-Big 12 schools.
- Quarterback Allan Evridge became K-State's most prolific freshman quarterback in school history, setting new freshman records for passing yards, touchdowns, attempts and completions.
